## SOUTHERN SPAIN & MOROCCO

From the 8th century, the Moors from North Africa ruled southern Spain, now Andalusia. They irrigated the dry plains and planted new crops: pomegranates, oranges, lemons, apricots, saffron, sugar and rice. For 400 years it was the most civilised and prosperous region in Europe. From **Seville** to **Córdoba** and **Granada** we will trace a semi-circle that takes in the most important Moorish sights.

As Andalusia was conquered by the Catholic monarchy, **Granada** became it's capital. Today, the Arab quarter thrives with it's maze of alleyways lined with bakeries, grocery stores and cafes. Wind up here at the Mirador San Nicolas to see the Alhambra Palace against the backdrop of the **Sierra Nevada**.

In **Seville**, the narrow winding streets, low white houses and fountain-cooled courtyards are classic features of Arab design. We have coincided our trip with the Seville Fair when the town comes alive with outdoor restaurants, flamenco dancing and nightly bullfighting.

With it's 70 libraries **Córdoba** was the Moorish capital for 250 years. It was a beacon of scholarship and it's cathedral,

formerly a mosque, was famed as Europe's largest and most beautiful holy building.

A journey to Spain would never be complete without **Madrid**. From the Prado museum to the Royal Palace and the San Miguel markets, Madrid is a vibrant, sophisticated city.

Throughout the centuries romantics have thought **Morocco** to be one of the most exotic places on Earth. The ancient market town of **Marrakech** was born as the first stop after the Atlas Mountains for trading caravans heading further into North Africa. One of the great attractions is the Jemma El Fna, the towns main square. This is the heart of the city, throbbing day and night with an extraordinary carnival of colourful bazaars, snake-charmers, storytellers, acrobats, dancers and mystical magicians drawing enthralled crowds.

World heritage city **Fes** is the country's spiritual heart. With its famed mosaic art, palaces, souks and old city wall it is almost entirely free of motor vehicles. It's narrow lanes are far better suited to mules and donkeys carrying everything from bags of cement to televisions in and out of the medina.
